INFORMATION REQUESTS

The letter written to request genealogical information can be

viewed by the correspondent as a welcome sharing or it may be tossed in File 13 (the trash can). A few simple guidelines can bring, not only a response, but a goldmine of information. Of course, there will always be exceptions. An example of this recently happened to me. I received two very different request letters, both concerning a surname I had placed in a genealogical publication. The first one was brief, easy to read, offered to share what little information she had, and enclosed a SASE (self-addressed-stamped envelope). I happened to have two generations beyond her known ancestor (with proof) and could give her data that might have taken years to find otherwise. Not only did she write to thank me, she furnished me with information that I needed. I believe we will be sharing for years to come.

The second letter ended up in File 13. The writer gave a bunch of names, one date (could not tell what the date pertained to) and not one place was mentioned. I have no idea if the ancestor she was researching was in Alabama, Virginia, Montana, or England. She wanted me to search my files for her family but, not only did she fail to give enough information, she did not send a SASE. It was impossible for me to help her and she probably considers me a scrooge for not answering her. Her time and a stamp was wasted by not knowing a few general guidelines to writing the request letter.

I hope the following will help anyone really interested to gain more from their correspondence.

1- Be brief and to the point.

"My ancestor was Joseph Smith, born 1854, Shelby Co., AL, married Mary Brown the 7 Sep 1878, Chilton Co., AL. The family tradition says that Joseph died about 1891 in Chilton Co. Would you be so kind to check your Smith files for any information on Joseph that may help me find his date and place of death. Being brief and to the point does not mean, "Send me everything you have on the Smith family." Believe it or not, I have received such requests.

2- Always offer to share the information that you have and pay for copies of documents, etc. Remember that the person you are writing has probably spent years and a lot of money in obtaining the data that you want just for the asking.

- 3- Always send a SASE (self-addressed-stamped-envelope). You can not expect someone to answer your request and pay for the postage, too.
- 4- After receiving the information, follow up with a "thank-you." It is discouraging to send data that you know will help the person and never even know if he received it. This has kept many a soul from reaping the benefits of information found later.
- 5- When requesting information from a record center, such as a courthouse, be even more brief. The clerk is not interested in knowing the reason you want the information or that John Brown is your long lost great-great grandfather on your mother's side. An example:

"Please advise me of the cost for a copy of the following:

Record - Marriage Groom - John Brown Bride - Mary Smith Date - Between 1882 & 1886."

Double space between the lines, center the names and dates so the clerk can quickly see the information needed. You may also want to include a check for no more than \$3 to cover the cost and request they advise you if the cost will be more.

Don't forget the SASE.

May good manners, simplicity and common sense bring you better results.

SOCIETY LOSES FORMER PRESIDENT

We are saddened to report that former President of the Chilton County Historical Society and Archives, John M. Higgins, after a relatively short illness, died while being treated in a Birmingham hospital. We will all miss his considerable contribution to our efforts and his support in so many aspects of our lives.

John Manning Higgins, was one of three children of Mr. Guy Higgins and his wife Mrs. Mary Davis Higgins. John is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ruth Gowan Higgins, and their two daughters and one granddaughter, his sister, Mary Ellen, and his brother, Guy.

John got an early start in his father's business and when a severe stroke debilitated his father, John was faced with ever greater responsibility. He had been educated in the local school system and attended Auburn University during the term of 1936-37. By the start of World War II, John had made amazing progress with his father's lumber business.

In 1942 he went to New Orleans and

went before a board of Officers and was commissioned directly as an Ensign in the U.S. Navy. As a consequence he was assigned to Cornell and then Harvard for intensive training for his future Naval duties. His first assignment in a combat zone was to the U.S.S. Montrose which was involved in the combat associated with the attempted invasion of the Aleutian Islands by the Japanese.

Subsequently, he served on the U.S.S. Montrose in the Pacfice Theater and was Communications officer for a Naval Division which participated in the invasion of islands in several parts of that theater. When the war was concluded he had risen to the rank of Lt. Commander, the rank he held at the time he was discharged. John continued his Naval service in the Naval Reserve for several years after the war.

On his return to the local scene he bought a lumber business from two local businessmen in Thorsby. He operated that business quite successfully for a number of years and then in 1962 after having continued his studies, at night, at UAB and Samford, entered the Law School at Samford. After receiving his degree he served as a professor at the same law school. In association with the University of Alabama, John traveled all over the state in an official capacity with City Planning Commissions for about two years. Still he followed the professorial regime until about 1968.

At that time he decided to enter in the practice of law on the local scene which he did with great distinction, serving in many public capacities as

well as serving a host of clients. At the same time he made a number of improvements in the city of Clanton and in some of the local properties which he had acquired.

A devoted father, successful businessman and lawyer, and a historian of no small accomplishment has passed from among us. We will all miss him.

COUNTY HISTORY

The following article is extracted from the Chilton County News 31 May, 1928. As the author was not named we assume that he wrote it. That particular issue was replete with photographs current at that time and offers the reader an interesting look at the county of that era. We offer the article in its entirety for its inherent value and in spite of a few inaccuracies.

"It would be a pleasing diversion to tell how De Soto crossed the county of Chilton and camped near the present site of Verbena. The narrative makes interesting reading and has but one defect, which is that not a word of it is true. According to Peter Brannon, of the State Department of Archives and His-'cry and other authorities on the travels of

Spanish explorer which ended with his burial in the Mississippi river, which he (DeSoto) discovered, never came within 50 miles of that point in the present county of

Chilton.

Chilton County's history is made up of relatively small incidents. The annals of that geographical and political subdivision of Alabama record no great battles upon its soil, no outstanding event of world importance. They tell rather of the struggle of a courageous people against the handicap of many years of isolation through lack of roads and other means of transportation; their efforts to combat the evils of illiteracy, to establish schools and churches, to build towns and homes. One must look for Chilton's great achievements in the near future, instead of in the past. That section of the hilly country west of the Coosa river was originally the hunting ground of the Upper Creek Indians. Their towns were chiefly on the Coosa county—east side of the river. West of the stream were the wooded hills where deer, bear and smaller game were hunted in due season, where numerous creeks afforded good fishing and refuge for beavers, valued for their meat and pelt. The Indian, on his own hunting ground, was a aconservationist, rarely killing game during its breeding seasons. The territory reserved for hunting was often used in common by numerous tribes, that recognized a truce from tribal wars when their hunting parties met upon these reservations.

There were Indian villages along Mulberry creek, and the mound builders left their monuments at various points, the largest of which may still be seen about 1 1/2 miles southeast of Thorsby.

Pioneers from the Carolinas, Virginia, and Georgia came with their negro slaves in 1833 and extablished permanent settlements, chiefly along Big Mulberry creek and other streams in the Coastal Plain areas of the county. Com and wheat were grown in quantities for local use and ground at numer-

ous mills operated by water power along the streams. Whenever the land became worn out by the crude and wasteful farming methods of those days, new forests were deadened, cleared and planted, while the old fields were used for grazing sheep and cattle and soon were covered with second growth timber.

Before the war between the sections freed the slaves, cotton became the staple crop of that region and some of the plantations contained from 1,000 to 5,000 acres. After the close of the war most of the large plantations were broken up and a new system of agriculture was gradually developed, though cotton has remained the chief crop.

Forests of long-leaf and short-leaf pine covered the greater part of the land and the first industrie's were the manufacture of lumber and naval stores. Logging and lumbering became the winter occupation of many of the small farmers. When the railroads came, the larger tracts of timber were soon removed and sawn into lumber at several large sawmills in different parts of the county.

Bibb, Autauga, Perry and Shelby counties lost portions of their territory when the legislature carved out of those four the present boundaries of Chilton county, on December 30, 1866 (1869). When first established the new political body was given the name of Baker county, for Alfred Baker, a prominent citizen of the Autauga section. On December 17, 1871 it was changed by act of legislature and named in honor of Judge William Chilton, chief justice of the supreme court and former member of the Confederate Congress, wherein he represented the Montgomery district.
